The non-governmental group works to keep water clean for drinking, fishing, swimming, and recreation by holding polluters accountable to the Clean Water Act throughout the Black Warrior River watershed, which spans 6,276 square miles in 17 Alabama counties.

The event will feature a \$39 Tapas Style meal with meat, vegetables and other delicious products of regional farms including Snow's Bend and [Katie Farms](#) from the Black Warrior River watershed.
